












- The project initiative was successfully set up new day care center with collaborating partnership between Pangthong village committee, Napupoom Sub-district (Tambon) Administration Organization (TAO), and Napupoom Health Promotion Hospital.
- The day care center serves 28 young children age around 2 - 4 years who are Black Lahu ethnic living in very remote village cluster next to border between Thailand and Myanmar. The day care center will operate under this project support until October, 2020, then Napupoom Sub-district (Tambon) Administration Organization (TAO) will take over with its government subsidy budget.





- Strengthen child protection mechanisms at the community level by capacitating CAGs to operate effectively, efficiently, and with minimal support from TLSDF
 - There are 55 community action group's members/villagers (CAG's members) who are child protection volunteers working along with the government and non-government agencies in two districts of Maehongson province covering 11 sub-districts, 104 villages.
- CAG's members conducted 12 case conferences and decided to provide all cases with living funds, and rebuild three safety home structures. (Two safety toilets and one bed room)
- CAGs' members referred 130 vulnerable children to receive 1,000 Thai Baht living funds from Maehongson Shelter for Children and Families

Career Advancement for Migrant Adolescents; (2020)

761 of migrant, ethnic and local adolescents aged 15-19 years who accessed comprehensive youth consultation process and career advancement and entrepreneurship courses incorporated and offered by local career advancement coalition, junior high schools, and existing vocational colleges.









Career Advancement for Migrant Adolescents; (2020)

70% of migrant adolescents who graduate M.3 (Grade 9) enrolled in vocational colleges and/or institutions that provide scholarships or income during study and job guaranteed courses.









Career Advancement for Migrant Adolescents; (2020)

2 ethnic and migrant adolescents who graduate M.3 (Grade 9) enrolled into institutions that provide job guaranteed courses.







Career Advancement for Migrant Adolescents; (2020)

TAOs were trained and enabled to identify vulnerable children, conduct home visit, and collect child case profiles, in associated with the TAO's sub-committee's in their respective community.

245 vulnerable children accessed to living funds and relief kits to fight with COVID-19 affect.









ICE/PROCEED

Promote sex education for ethnic indigenous and high hill community youths to prevent and solve problems of adolescent pregnancy



- 17 teachers (4 schools) trained on project curriculum
- 100 teachers (4 schools) trained on sex ed
- 50 youth leaders trained on leadership,
 prevention of trafficking, early pregnancy,
 disease, and harm
- 1xxx youth received formal PROCEED
 trainings led by their youth leader peers

EAPHP

eliminating all physical and humiliating punishment







- 80 parents trained in Positive Discipline in Nakhon Jedee sub-district of Lamphun (2018)
- 64 trained parents show follow-up PD progress
- 25 core youth group members received media training on how to promote EAPHP awareness
- 4 core youth groups supported in producing EAPHP awareness media
- 5 core youth leaders supported in participating in situational and data analysis training in order to formulate a child report to the UN
- 12 partners attended EAPHP's National Thai forum
- 350 community members exposed to concepts of EAPHP through two awareness campaigns (Lampun and Pai)









- 214 direct beneficiaries
 - 19 patients received HV surgery
 - 8 pediatric patients received heart surgery
- Two mobile heart screening activities conducted in Chiang Kam in Phayao (95 screened) and in Mae Sot (92 children)
- 28 family members and caregivers received info on post-op patient care
- Two heart patients received home visit/support
- Indirect beneficiaries
 - 88 patient families/other hospital patients received info on heart disease and prevention through pamphlets, activities, and games





Pillar 1.

Life Skills Promotion through Sport for Development;

Training and Tournament

- Pillar 1. (1)
- 43 coaches and referees were trained to organize 'Sport For Development' (S4D) to promote intercultural learning along with the tournaments. They reached out and organized S4D activity with 384 migrant adolescents and local youths to spread the message
- 352 girls and boys from 4 target subdistricts participated in S4D, (Girls in valley ball, boys in 7 players soccer),
- 2,398 reached with information about the football and volleyball tournament (online/offline/ f2f)
- Another 423 migrant adolescents and local youths were reached through 3 sub-districts S4D expanded tournaments (MaeNgon, MaeSoon and MonPin)

Pillar 2. MYN

- ✓ 1179 migrant adolescents and local youths were reached out by MYN
 - ✓ 84 cases of vulnerable children who need urgent assistance were transferred and accessed to government multi-disciplinary team members from sub-district, district and provincial agencies.

Pillar 3. Migrant youth engage in career advancement activities

• a.) 395 M.1-3 students attended the hybrid courses in 5 piloting middle schools and Fang Vocational College b.) 24 local youths attended the short courses in community setting for migrant youth leaders and their peers c. 2 M.3 gradated girls attended job guaranteed course in Muang district of Chiang Mai.





Pillar 4.

<u>Creating coordinating structure in the community to support the programme; building up 'Sub-district Child Proctect Taskforce'</u>

- * 79 community volunteers from 4 TAOs were trained and enabled to identify vulnerable children, conduct home visit, and collect child case profiles, in associated with the TAO's sub-committee's in their respective community. 1371 vulnerable child case profiles are collected and will be analysed by CVs.
- The 83 TAO's sub-committee's members attended refresher training on how to provide care, development and protection to in-needed children
- The attempt is successfully bring in civil society to network with government collaborating network, 19 agencies to address problems and needs of children and youth particularly the migrant children in Fang district.

- 130 cases transferred to Maehongson Shelter for Children and Family Care (OVC)
- Three cases were supported through home renovation/reconstruction and safety development (OVC)
- 84 Cases support by living funds (DMAP)
- 20 scholarship distribution by AV Japan
- 6 scholarship distribution by TLSDF central fund





Our new project in 2020

Migrant Women Empowerment for Children's Health Care and Development Promotion (MWEC) Support by KNH Germany.

- Facilitate 8 SHGs/ 120 migrant women
- Support 240 migrant children to access to nutrient food, basic education, and health care services
- In Nongharn sub-district of Sansai District, Chiang Mai





Our initial proposal to Swiss Embassy's small grant project

1. Life Skills Tour Project

 Serving around 2000 migrant youths in 20 expanded opportunity schools with Life Skills; 'Fact of Life Lessons' on Child Rights, reproductive health care, educational pathways, vocational pathways and how to develop legal status (Fang and Sansai district of Chiang Mai)

2. Rights For Every Child; A Fair Chance

Facilitate 11 CAGs to establish as legal entities (legalized Community-based Organization), then support them to reach out and assist 110 most vulnerable ethnic and local Thai children with our living fund scheme.




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
